



## **Wyoming Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program Strategic Planning for 2027-2031 (or 2027-2037)**

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program (PFW) mission is “working with others to conserve, protect and enhance fish, wildlife, and plants and their habitats for the continuing benefit of the American people”. Goals prioritize 1) restoration and protection of habitats that increase Federal Trust Species or Wyoming Species of Greatest Conservation Need, 2) broad, strong voluntary partnerships, 3) information sharing and communication with stakeholders, partners, decision-makers, and others who protect, restore, and enhance trust resources, and 4) maintaining and supporting our staff to ensure that they remain leaders in achieving on-the-ground Federal Trust Species conservation.

**PFW supports voluntary habitat restoration on private and tribal lands** through technical and financial assistance. PFW proactively collaborates with Federal, State, non-government organizations and individuals to further conservation for fish and wildlife across Wyoming. Our foundational cornerstones include trust, respect, honesty, flexibility, friendship, and two-way communication.

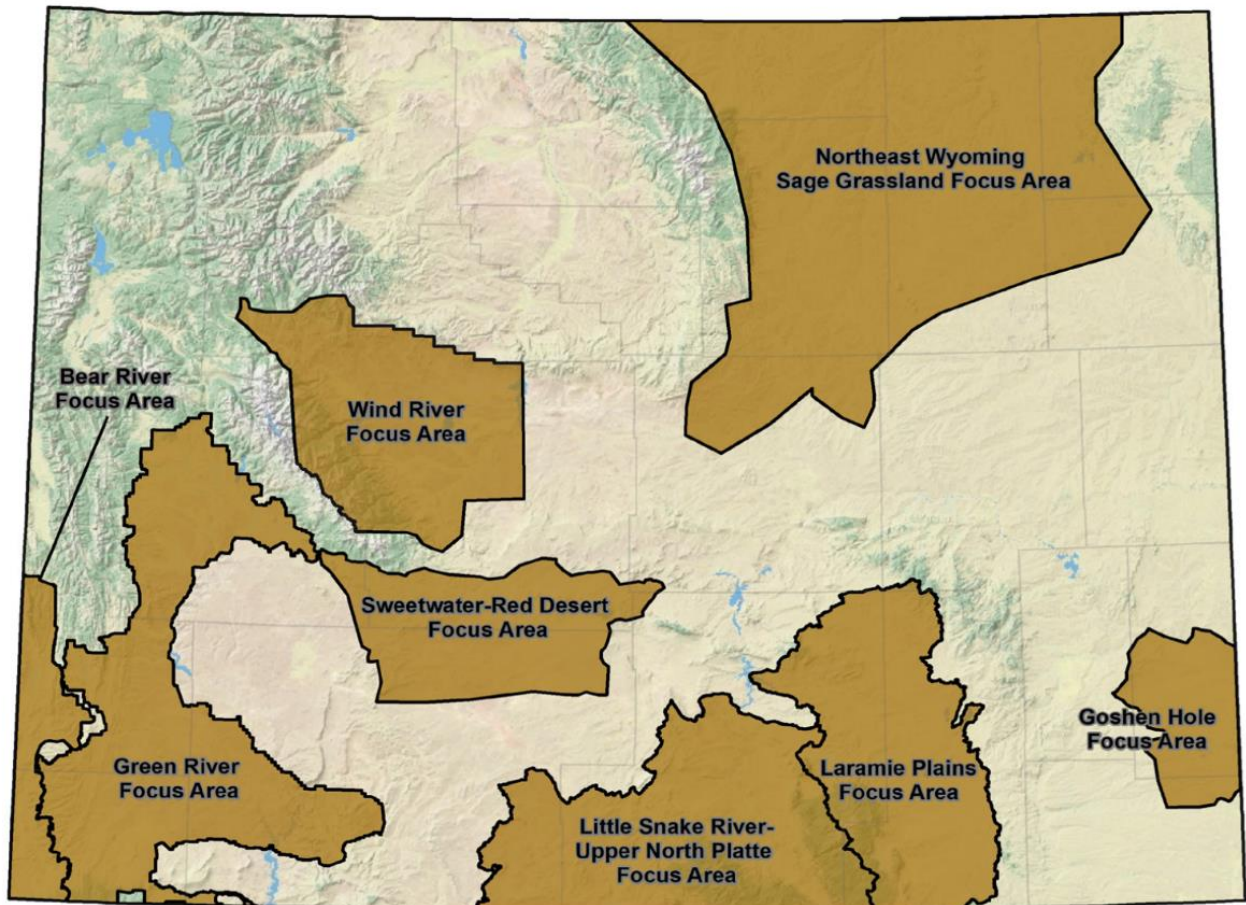
